Sunnynook Scout Group began in 1979, A meeting was called for on 12th June 1979 to set up a Committee and Leaders for the Sunnynook Scout Group. They first meet in the Community Centre

According to the first Cub Records they held their First cub meeting on August 14th with 1 leader and 2 assistant leaders being invested. On 16th October they invested 12 Boys, with another 11 boys on 23rd October followed by 5 more boys on 29th October.

They attended Expo 1979 on 25th August Gang Show 28th August and 3rd September was 1st night back after August School holidays.

Akela called the roll, had an inspection, prayer and the Grand Howl, Baloo took a game in attendance was the District Commissioner aka Rikki and also Kea aka Edith Rickard. There were 30 cubs in the pack The reward badges were Bronze, Silver and Gold Arrows.

The month of September was Programme building with Baden-Powell, Cub Law, Cub Promise and Know others in the pack.

October was taken up with Rules and Laws, Duty to the Queen, Abiding by the Law, School Rules and Home Rules.

November saw them learn Health, Water, Teeth, at a Camp, and a Games evening.

The cost was 10 cents per session.

Sunnynook Scout Group

The Mayor of Takapuna Wyn Hoadley turned the first sod at the site of the proposed Sunnynook Scout Den watched by members of the Scout group. Mrs Hoadley addressed the Cubs and Scouts saying that in years to come they would be able to look back at the den and remember the day it started.

Chairman of the Sunnynook scout group Committee Ron Bethune said that construction would commence shortly. The first stage would be the fin Ground construction. Stage 2 would take place on a Gala day planned for November when the remaining Structure would be erected. Mr Bethune thanked Mrs Hoadley for input to the project from herself and from council officers including providing the land.

11th March 1997 District Commissioner Warren Davis presented group leader Keith Duffin with the Chief Scout Commendation.


Chairman's Report 1997
